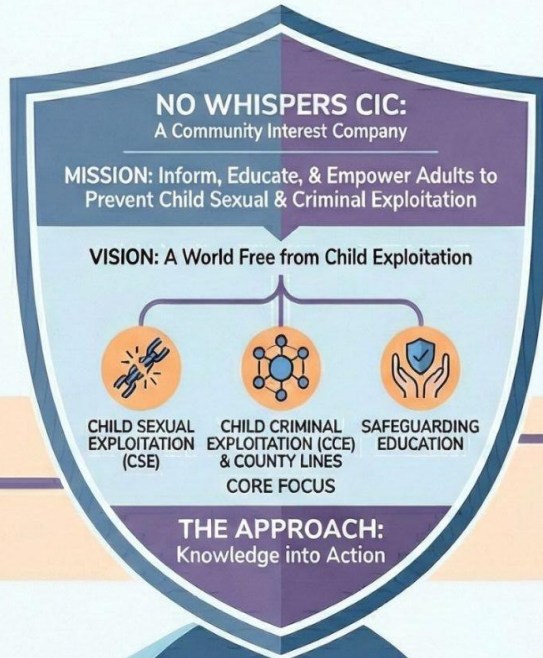

Background & Context

No Whispers Community Interest Company (CIC) was established by Karen Livesey on 28th Feb 2020 with the aim of tackling Child Sexual Exploitation and Child Criminal Exploitation. Different sources lead us to believe that child exploitation is a thing of the past and yet if we look closer, we can see the problem of Child Sexual Exploitation and Child Criminal Exploitation are of significant and current concerns, impacting people and communities across the country.



The [Government's Tackling Child Sexual Abuse Progress Update](#), April 2025, identifies how the scale of child sexual abuse is truly staggering as children make up only **20%** of the population but are the victims of **40%** of all sexual offences.

We know from research from the Home Office, The Children's Society, and the NSPCC that Child Sexual Exploitation (CSE), Child Criminal Exploitation (CCE), and County Lines are not isolated issues but are deeply interconnected through shared grooming tactics, methods of control, and the "layering" of abuse.

The [Working Together to Safeguard Children](#) now groups child sexual exploitation and child criminal exploitation under the same "Extra-familial Harm" Framework. This is nothing new as child exploitation can take many forms including forced begging, child financial exploitation and county lines. [The Keeping Children Safe in Education](#) increasingly links children missing from home with the risk of child exploitation.

[Home Office estimates](#) show that approximately **15,500** children were identified as at risk or involved in child criminal exploitation in the year ending March 2025, this is likely to be a

significant underestimate on the scale of the problem.

No Whispers CIC leads change by educating and informing people about the issues and complexities of child sexual exploitation and child criminal exploitation. It creates safe space, innovative training and promotes a better understanding, so we can each make a difference and contribute towards a safer community and prevent children and young people from becoming victims of exploitation & abuse.

Right Here, Right Now National Lottery

No Whispers CIC was awarded a National Lottery Community Fund for the Right Here, Right Now contextual safeguarding project in South Ribble. This project aimed to help volunteers, parents & carers and members of the community understand child sexual and criminal exploitation through interactive, informative and impactful activities. Objectives included gaining knowledge of the grooming process and how people can prevent children and young people from becoming victims of abuse.

Project - South Ribble



Impact from the Right Here Right Now project included:

A better understanding of child exploitation and increased confidence in order to take further action. Examples include updating Safeguarding policies, questioning & challenging interventions from social workers, police and family Councillors and improved relationships with family members.

Preventing children and young people from becoming victims of sexual exploitation. Many people recognised early stages of grooming both in person and online. One mother identified signs of online grooming only because she had attended the workshops. She reported it to the police and appropriate support was provided from the police exploitation team. This issue occurred many times with people recognising the signs and spotting child exploitation in their community.

Safeguarding Zines & leaflets provided an opportunity to share helpful resources and have immediate conversations with people. This was significant on the Uniform day where we spoke to **200** parents who shared concerns about online abuse and intimate images. We were able to give contacts for help and advice.

Recognising & reporting Cuckooing

- members of the community identified properties that were being 'cuckooed' and disrupted exploitation because of Right Here, Right Now training and workshops delivered to professionals and community members.

Increased confidence & the ability to articulate child exploitation, contextual safeguarding and extra-familial harm issues of concern and report them appropriately.

A lifeline when someone disappears

Webinars

The partnership working between Missing People and Karen Livesey from No Whispers Community Interest Company has been, and continues to be, really valuable. Combining our skills and areas of expertise enabled us to deliver impactful webinars for professionals and parents, carers and family members to raise awareness of child exploitation. By using our networks and through targeted, local promotion and awareness raising by No Whispers CIC, these sessions have reached a wide range of professionals and families, who have shared positive feedback and indicated 100 % increased awareness of exploitation, how to recognise it and how to seek support. The level of interest and attendee numbers indicate that future partnership sessions of this type would be well-received: **89** people attended the webinars: **57** professionals & **32** family members.

Safeguarding zines

No Whispers Community Interest Company has raised awareness and promoted the Missing People exploitation support service at local and national events including in-person conferences and through the creation and distribution of **6,000** safeguarding zines (mini magazines) outlining support available from key charities and professionals.

Royal Preston Hospital

In partnership with Missing People a digital campaign was created by No Whispers CIC and Pro Vision World. A 60 second video included Missing People's support service, and QR code and was shown throughout the year at the Royal Preston Hospital in the waiting rooms for Adult A & E, Children's A & E and Urgent Social Care. The QR codes were scanned and accessed **40 times: 30 individuals** for exploitation support and **10 individuals** for our Safecall Helpline / missing support.

My Time with No Whispers CIC

I was given the chance to volunteer as part of a series of workshops for parents, carers and volunteers as part of the Right here, right now project, awarded a National Lottery Community Fund. I got involved with teaching and independently presented workshops on British legislation, social media platforms, the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child and Adverse Childhood Experiences. I also attended a Lancashire Constabulary Police and Crime Expo, supported shared lived experience events and was awarded a Certificate by the High Sheriff of Lancashire as part of a Celebration event. Otherwise, I was helping facilitate training to the group on child sexual and criminal exploitation.

The Right here, right now project addressed grooming, cuckooing, county lines, trafficking, modern slavery and of course, safeguarding. In South Ribble, we were able to see instant results. The environment I built from dedication and attending every session, putting hard work in behind the scenes and being a listening ear, meant that the community members felt safe to share their experiences. Some people built stronger relationships with their children and grandchildren, some people began to perceive situations they saw in media and real life differently whilst others started seeing their childhood with a different light, seeing the injustices.

Not only did I bring education to the group, but I found education too. Constantly taking notes and remembering websites and quotes to research later. Not many can say they completed

volunteering like this, and I am all the better for it.



The most important lesson I was taught was how to recognise a listening audience, even if they are not actively participating. It's a lesson to all on reading body language, and that not everyone processes as fast as others, so that they will have something to say. Sometimes we like to sit in our own brain and consume what is going on around us, especially when the topics can be seen as candid, powerful and pointing as this.

Alex changed both her professional & personal approach since attending No Whispers CIC training:

“This training has had a significant and measurable impact on my professional practice as a teacher in FE as through this training programme, and development of a much deeper understanding of CSE which I have been able to implement into my own lessons around safeguarding within the apprenticeship programmes I deliver.

By equipping my learners predominantly those working in residential children's services with clearer knowledge of safeguarding processes, rights and responsibilities, they too are more empowered to contribute to safer homes, peer groups through knowledge sharing and the wider community impact.

Frankie

Frankie is a registered children's home manager with eight years' experience working in social care when he attended a training course for child sexual exploitation awareness. No Whispers CIC was recommended to him via a colleague who said the organisation had great leadership and disseminated fantastic knowledge and Frankie saw this for himself on the training course. "The most valuable thing from the course was the empowerment for the community. Seeing the collaboration amongst a group of new people and companies who want to protect children was amazing and it was clear someone like Karen was needed in the community. Especially seeing collaboration with a local mayor and sheriff, it was really amazing. In the group, there were two young people, probably late teens, who were engaging massively and it was so lovely to see the sessions not just impacting adults, carers, parents, and professionals but also young people and this inclusion was brilliant." Frankie experienced first-hand how collaborating and learning with a wide range of people helps everyone to broaden their knowledge and create a bigger impact. "There were even people from victim support and addiction support groups on the course, making the cross-sector need for this evident." Through the course, Frankie has not only widened his knowledge but has also met friends within the sector and they've stayed in contact, messaging each other for advice and taking a collaborative approach to this massive problem.

No Whispers is amazing, but this needs to be shouted from the rooftops. Now, more collaboration is needed to spread awareness, and maybe also finding external professionals who can offer support to children affected." - Frankie

Rebecca

Rebecca is a mature student studying a health and social care degree, she came across No Whispers CIC through a university placement. In her degree, she had already covered a lot of theory work on child sexual exploitation and county lines and found that No Whispers courses widened her lens and how she looks at the wider community, plus gave her new and relevant language for the workplace and community. The learning and experience also helped her to recognise signals in body language and approach the topic in a more trauma-informed way. The course also gave her valuable connections, inside and outside of university with wider agencies. It has also changed her perspective on employment avenues after graduation; she is now looking more into family liaison officer positions as she wants to be able to build better relationships with the families. "There's still so much work to be done, especially around challenging policies and legislation, and more agencies need to be involved, particularly schools." The course also prompted Rebecca to take a research module at university where she researched the experience of deployment and mobility on attachment and development for children of military families, also prompted by her own experience of growing up in the military and witnessing the grooming and coercion that happens. Since being involved in the course, Rebecca has been signposting people from her workplace to No Whispers for CPD and has been volunteering with the team at a range of events to help support their work.
